a letter from the chairman . . .

As I write, the fall colors are beautiful and the temperatures are milder than normal for the north woods. It was a great summer to be at the lake, despite the late start.

Green algae balls on the lake in spring became a minor issue that was easily resolved. The aquatic plant cutting had a late start because of the cold and rainy weather. Ed Walter of Lake Renewal Company in Wittenberg, Wisconsin, was our new contractor for this year's plant cutting; there was much positive feedback about his friendliness and over-all job.

Clean Boat Clean Waters was a huge success. The Lake District dock was installed at the boat landing to relieve some of the congestion at the launching, which was a great idea and worked out well.

Paper work has been completed for our Lake Plan. A big "Thank You" to all who attended meetings and volunteered with projects. The time spent was appreciated and compensated for with grant dollars. We should be receiving the grant money soon.

Our next project involves completing a study to check muck accumulation in the lake and the flow of Pine Creek. These studies could give us some insight into future dredging possibilities, but at this time, those decisions have not been made.

Gregg Matzke, fish biologist for Forest and Florence counties, reports that the State does not presently have a consistent legal size for northern pike. The few regulations that are in place will not work on Pine Lake. Although a fish study is scheduled for 2017, Gregg will try to get here sooner if time allows. It is expected that

Clean Boats – Clean Waters

Through the efforts of Commissioner Paul Gagnon and inspectors Dave Houle and Paul Johnson, approximately 1400 boats were inspected before entering and leaving Pine Lake this year. Boat inspectors help perform boat and trailer checks, disseminate informational brochures, and educate boaters on the prevention of spreading aquatic invasive species. Almost 3,200 people were contacted during the inspections and reminded of their obligation to prevent the transport of aquatic plants, animals, and water from one water body to another.

Next year Pine Lake District has been awarded a grant from the DNR to offset some of the cost of continuing this program. Additional information on maintaining the quality of Pine Lake can be found at:

Blue-Green Algae Blooms

Amid the hot summer weather, blue-green algae blooms have appeared “off and on” on neighboring Lake Kentuck, covering beaches and favorite fishing spots. The conditions were perfect for these small blooms that clung together to form “mats” of slime. This thick green or bluish-green scum often smells like sewage or manure when it piles along shores and begins to decompose. People may experience eye, ear, or skin irritation, as well as vomiting and diarrhea when exposed to the bluish-green algae. Dogs are at particularly great risk of dying from exposure to these algae because they may ingest large amounts of toxins by drinking from lakes. People, especially children, are advised to avoid swimming, wading, skiing, or coming in contact with the blue-green algae blooms.

Although different forms of algae have appeared on Pine Lake, we are lucky that blue-green algae blooms have not been found. Please help us keep our lake clean and free from these harmful plants.

How Can I Help?

In order to improve the water quality of Pine Lake, it will be necessary to reduce the incoming phosphorous and sediment from the lake's shoreline properties. Sources for these unwanted substances include faulty septic systems, shoreline areas that are maintained in an unnatural way, and impervious surfaces. The District intends to initiate an educational program aimed at raising awareness among property owners concerning their impacts on the lake. Committee members are needed to gather information, publish newsletter articles, and recruit appropriate speakers for District meetings. Plant Harvesting

The Board was happy to receive favorable comments regarding plant harvesting during July and August. Many of us had the opportunity to meet contractor Ed Walder from Lake Renewal Company in Wittenberg as he moved up and down the shoreline. Special efforts were made to clear lanes from docks to open waters and to expand and widen fish lanes. Not much growth, however, was experienced in the center of the lake owing to the murky water this year. A total of forty-six truckloads, or approximately 138,000 pounds of unwanted plants, were removed and taken to the farm of Joe and Dick Herman. We look forward to seeing Ed and his cutter on Pine Lake again next summer.
